





Figure 10. Critical source areas for P loss from a watershed occur where areas of high soil P and transport potential coincide.



Pilot Project proposals


Leningrad region

- Poultry factory: 0,7 Million birds, insufficient manure management
- Cattle farm: 10 000 juveniles, no manure storage
- Pigs&cattle farm: 8000 pigs and 1000 dairy cows, insufficient manul management

Kaliningrad region

- Slavsky municipal pilot: 10 farms, holisitic management of manure
- Cattle farm: 430 animals, no manure management
- Small pig farm: observed high leakages, no manure storage





Implementation of measures

- Pilot projects financed by BALTHAZAR (limited budget)
 - Implementable and where project input would make a difference
 - Commitment and co-financing
 - Model for other similar farms
- Large investments at priority farms need combination of different financing sources
 - National programmes
 - IFIS
 - Co-financing by enterprises
- Commitment by authorities necessary to implement environmental requirements at farms
- Incentives to implement requirements



Upcoming:

- Steering Group Meeting Baltic Sea Day
 - Decisions on pilot projects
- Development and implementation of pilot projects by February 2011
- Phase II will start probably in 2011 with 1 year implementation period
 - Continuation of pilots
 - Input to HELCOM assessments
- Recommendation: Risk assessment and prioritization of farms to be done by other CPs!
