Session 1 - discussion:

- Need for a more representative forum, including communities/civil society
- Impacts are more than flows, also salinity, sediments, water quality, biodiversity and people
- Fisheries in upper reaches/tributaries still matter
- Daily operation of dams to be considered
- PNPCA a private sector concern, but a government responsibility





Session 2 - presentations:

- Ambitious power development plans in LMB countries, with sharply accelerating HP development
- Benefits form HP both eoconomic (trade) and social (rural electrification)
- Recognition of need to respect the 1995-A
- •Small to positive flow impacts of China dams, some impacts on sediments, none on fish migration
- An integrated system, ref. GMS power sharing





Session 2 - discussion:

- HP projects for PNPCA individually, but in basin context -- long timeframes, mainly MS dams
- Need to ensure transparency in HP data, information, EIA, CIA..
- •NT2 a good example, but not directly replicable
- HP development only one aspect of countries' multisector development plans





Said about MRC's role:

- Provider of independent information, data and studies
- Provider of useful tools (BDP/DSF modeling, SEA, CIA..)
- •Already contributing to HP through existing programs (FP, EP, BDP, NP)
- Providing a forum
- ... but so far little specifics on proposed HP Program





Said about this Consultation:

Timely and unique: Bringing the water/environment and energy communities together on a key issue for the region

•A true multi-stakeholder gathering (albeit without direct community representation)
