[Output1] Tafaigata landfill monitoring

Tafaigata landfill in Samoa is now facing some minor problems to maintain the landfill as a sanitary landfill due to several issues such as waste-pickers, change in landfill personnel, and a landfill fire. The Project has reviewed the basic concept of the semi-aerobic landfill and examined the current situation and current issues at the landfill to identify gaps in knowledge and technical expertise. The contents of the in-country training workshop to be undertaken from December 1-10, 2008 have been designed to address these gaps.

[Output2] In-Country Training for National Solid Waste Management Strategy ("NSWMS")

The Project has held In-Country Training workshops in several countries, to provide assistance and guidance in the development of a National Solid Waste Management Strategy (NSWMS). The intended outcome of the workshop is a draft of the NSWMS and Action Plan in line with the Regional Strategy. As from August 2008, the NSWMS Workshops has been held in the following two countries:

Almost all the islands of RMI were represented at the Workshop and they shared the specific issues faced in their individual islands with the other attendees. Participants were also impressed to have a look the existing landfill in Pohnpei since it was well-managed in the past. In the Workshop, we discussed the importance of waste minimization, the responsibility of EPA, waste management in neighboring islands, and so on. After the Workshop, the National Waste Strategy writing team, "Waste Warriors" was set up for drafting the Strategy and Action Plan. Their challenge has just started.

There should be different approaches needed. There are markedly different situations and issues among, and even within, the four States which are Yap, Chuuck, Pohnpei and Kosrae, reflecting both the conditions of the environment and the social structures. The most remarkable thing is that the Workshop gave all national and state officials the first opportunity of gathering together at the same table. Representatives at state level presented the current situation and issues in each state, with discussion taking place among all states in order to identify common issues and develop a National Strategy and Action Plan. National government officials introduced strategies for accesses existing financial schemes. In addition, the first sanitary landfill has been constructed using the Semi-Aerobic Landfill methods in Kosrae State of FSM, and it will soon begin its operations. Therefore, Mr.Faafetai Sagapolutele, the former Principle Officer Waste Management of MNRE, was invited for the Workshop and introduced the concept of semi-aerobic landfill and lessons learned based on the experience in Tafaigata landfill in Samoa. There was a considerable amount of discussions, and exchange of the information in the Workshop, which benefited all participants.
