The Pacific Year of the Sea Turtle campaign was the Secretariat of the Pacific launched on 1 March at SPREP Headquarters in Regional Environment Apia, Samoa. Once hunted in the Pacific as part of subsistence living, increasing human populations, the introduction of new fishing technology, pollution and 💠 loss of feeding and nesting habitats in the Pacific have resulted in reduced turtle numbers.

The Year of the Sea Turtle is a regional campaign that aims to reverse the rapid decline in turtle numbers by:

Promoting community conservation of turtle nesting, feeding and foraging sites



Fostering partnerships for long-term conservation

With almost all species of turtles considered threatened with extinction, SPREP believes that the Pacific must undertake renewed efforts to * promote the need for turtle conservation in the region.

SPREP believes the critical success factor in this campaign is the participation of key partners including national governments, intergovernmental organizations, communities, fisheries and tourism authorities, donors, and NGOs.

The 2006 Pacific Year of the Sea Turtle is a key element of the Marine Species Programme Framework (2003-2007) developed and endorsed by Pacific island countries and territories. The Framework guides SPREP's work in marine species conservation in the Pacific.

SPREP is a regional intergovernmental organisation working with Pacific island countries and territories to strengthen environmental management and promote sustainable development.

Regional collaboration and cooperation

Given their migratory nature and status, turtle conservation requires regional participation and collaboration. SPREP's members coordinated their national launches to coincide with the regional launch. These included:

American Samoa

As part of their national launch, a team from American Samoa attached a satellite tag on a nesting hawksbill turtle at Malota. "Ms Malota" was tagged and released on 28 February, two days before the national launch ceremony.

American Samoa's theme for the year is:

Sacred. Heritage. Pride: Save Our Turtles - Talaaga ma mitamitaga: Faasao le l'a Sa, Year of the Sea Turtle - 2006

Cook Islands

The Cook Islands campaign was launched on 1 March by Minister Teina Bishop, with a call to students of Avatea School to become "warriors" to campaign on behalf of turtles.

The students were encouraged to support turtle conservation efforts by protecting turtles and through sharing information about the importance of these ancient creatures to Cook Islands' culture and heritage.

Students of Avatea Primary School produced poems and pictures to mark the launch of the Cook Islands Year of the Sea Turtle.

Fiii

The Fiji national launch focused on strengthening partnerships with representatives from the private sector and promoting their critical role in turtle conservation initiatives.

The Fiji campaign was jointly launched by the CEO FINTEL, Mr. Sakaraia Tuilakepa and the Managing Director of Pacific Manufacturers Limited, Mr. Viliame Lega, at the WWF Fiji office in Suva on 2 March 2006.

Tracking turtles - learning more about turtle migration routes

The regional launch of the Year of the Sea Turtle was marked by the tagging and release of two turtles from Samoa. A green turtle (Miss Lina) and a hawksbill nester turtle (Lady Vini) were the first turtles to be tagged in a regional programme that will monitor the movements of five turtles throughout the region. The tagging was undertaken by SPREP and the Ministry of Natural Resources, **Environment** and Meteorology (MNREM) of the Government of Samoa. The tagging programme will provide invaluable information about their migratory routes and illustrate that turtle conservation is a shared Top: Map of Lady Vini's responsibility.

The tagging programme is supported by the Marine Turtle Research Program, NOAA, Hawaii.

Other SPREP members that are targeted for the satellite tagging programme include French Polynesia, Fiji and Tonga.


Pacific regional turtle conservation efforts

Following a directive from SPREP members, the Secretariat is working with the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species (CMS) Secretariat and other key partners to progress regional arrangements for marine turtles.

The CMS Conference of Parties meeting in November 2005 adopted a recommendation encouraging Parties and range states in the Pacific to cooperate to develop a Memorandum of Understanding and associated Conservation Plan for the conservation and management of marine turtles in that region under the CMS.

The resolution also encourages existing Pacific regional conservation programs and instruments relevant to marine turtles to participate in the development and implementation of a regional conservation arrangement for marine turtles in the Pacific.

ASEAN efforts to boost turtle numbers

The Pacific Year of the Sea Turtle coincides with the launch of a sister campaign in the Indian Ocean, coordinated by the Indian Ocean, South East Asian Memorandum of Understanding Secretariat in Bangkok (IOSEA).

The IOSEA Year of the Turtle aims to unite nations and communities to celebrate marine turtles and to support their conservation. While increasing public awareness and understanding of the threats faced by marine turtles, the campaign will also highlight the work of organisations working to conserve sea turtles.

Turtles found in the Pacific

Six of the world's seven species of turtles are found in the Pacific. Five of the sea turtles found in the Pacific are listed on the IUCN Red List of Threatened Animals. IUCN is an international organization that monitors the state of the world's species and determines their risk of extinction, or the risk of species disappearing forever.
