

Turtle database launched for trial in Vanuatu Turtle Talk is developed by

Information to support turtle conservation in the Asia-Pacific region is now more accessible due to the redevelopment of a turtle database.

Launched for trial on 12 June, the Turtle Research and Monitoring Database System (TREDS) is a Pacific-wide research database that will coordinate the large volumes of data collected from turtle

research and monitoring.

The database can store information on tag deployment, nesting beach and foraging ground monitoring data, clutch and hatchling information, and biological samples (such as genetic data). It can systematically inventory tags used per project, help standardize data collection protocols, and generate project-specific and site-specific summary reports.

Since 2004, SPREP has been working with a network of government agencies, non-government organisations, and community groups to collate all historical and current data on turtles

available at SPREP, and in member countries and territories.

SPREP has also supported various turtle monitoring programmes throughout the region such as the Wan Smolbag Theatre Vanua Tai Monitoring Programme that has been tagging turtles and promoting marine turtle conservation since the 1995 Year of the Sea Turtle Campaign.

Samoa releases 16 turtles to mark national launch

In celebration of their national launch, the Samoan Ministry of Natural Resources, Environment and Meteorology (MNREM) tagged and released 16 turtles that had been kept in captivity in the Malua Theological College fish pond.

For the past three years, the College has been collaborating with MNREM to tag and release turtles in support of the national conservation programme.

The turtle population in Samoa is known to be declining, and the Division of Conservation and Environment of MNREM has been working with communities to help save and protect the remaining turtles species found in Samoa. These are the Hawksbill turtle (*Eretmochelys imbricata*), Green turtle (*Chelonia mydas*) and the Leatherback turtle (*Dermochelys coriacea*).

The launch coincided with Samoa's Biodiversity Day, and marks a significant commitment to promote turtle conservation efforts.

The Division continues to work closely with SPREP (based in Samoa) to promote initiatives that support turtle conservation including the regional satellite tagging programme.

Attended by more than 80 school children, tourists and representatives from hotels, the day-long celebration included exhibitions, displays, creation of a mural, as well as the official launch of the Citizen of the Ocean Passport in French Polynesia.

World Ocean Day activities were coordinated by Te Mana o te Moana, with the support of the Moorea Dolphin Center and the Hotel InterContinental.

Te Mana o te Moana is a non profit association that strives to protect the marine environment of French Polynesia and to educate the public.



Since being tagged and released on 6 March 2006, Lady Vini has crossed the Exclusive Economic Zones (EEZs) of five Pacific island countries and territories, clearly illustrating the need for regional cooperation to conserve sea turtles.

SPREP is working to coordinate a regional dialogue to develop an Memorandum of Understanding and associated Conservation Plan for the conservation and management of marine turtles in the Pacific.

Tetepare Descendants' Association Protecting their natural heritage

Since 2002, the Tetepare Descendants' Association has been working with its key partners to implement a community-based turtle nesting monitoring programme.

Tetepare Island, in the Western Province of the Solomon Islands, is the largest uninhabited island in the South Pacific. Formed in 2002, the Association represents the descendents of the original Tetepare Islanders who fled the island 150 years ago.

Their conservation work includes community education training and initiatives to support nest and egg protection of nesting turtles.

Turtle monitors collect basic biological data such as track width, number of nests and number of hatchlings on known turtle beaches.

Launch of Turtle Bags in Samoa



SPREP with members of the private sector have developed the Turtle Bag, a reusable and viable alternative to plastic bags that will be available from Apia supermarkets. This initiative will support the Government of Samoa's regulations on plastic bags, and also raise awareness of the

The Turtle Bags aim to change behaviour through providing alternatives to plastic bags

Partners in this initiative include ANZ Samoa, AQM, Pacific Forum Line, and the Samoan Broadcasting Corporation as media partner. A key element of the Turtle Bag initiative is the creation of the ANZ Save the Turtle Fund. For every Turtle Bag sold, ANZ Samoa will donate SAT1.00 towards community-based turtle conservation initiatives.

The Turtle Bags will be officially launched in Apia, Samoa in August.
